You May Not Know...



In a new environmental science study, polyethylene plastic containers – used for household cleaners, pesticides, personal care products and, potentially, food packaging tested positive for polyfluoroalkyl (PFAS - discussed in a previous Bulletin Bird). Results showed the PFAS were capable of migrating from the fluorinated containers into food, resulting in a direct route of significant exposure to the hazardous chemicals, which have been linked to several health issues including prostate, kidney and testicular cancers, low birth weight, immunotoxicity and thyroid disease.

A Brief Focus

Power Treats are high-powered nuggets that are beneficial for birds requiring extra energy following an illness, or for birds with dry flaky skin, beak or nails and feathers that lack bright coloration or sheen, or for aging birds.

They contain a high carotenoid and antioxidant content and are most often used as a treat for enrichment or as a short-term incentive for a bird to try more of a long-term maintenance nugget. Power Treats are also used as an energy booster to prepare racing pigeons for long-range flying.
